## Plants New or Noteworthy which have flowered in the Royal Botanic Garden, Edinburgh, during 1933

- Androsace sarmentosa Wall. in Roxb. Fl. Ind. ii (1824), 14; Bot. Mag. t. 6210. The true plant raised from seed sent from Nepal by courtesy of the Maharajah. April. Rock Garden.
- Anemone obtusiloba D. Don forma patula Craib in Bot. Mag. cxli (1915), t. 8636. A fine blue-flowered buttercup from Mt. Victoria, Burma. Presented by the late Mr. Barton, The Bush, Antrim. May. Rock Garden.
- Aroeuthohium Oxycedri Bieb. Fl. Taur. Cauc. Suppl. 629; Hook. Fl. Bor.-Amer. t. 99, (1833). A minute mistletoe of the Western Himalayas, which grows in large bunches on the branches of Juniperus macropoda. Presented by the Botanic Garden, Munich. Plant Houses.
- Cremanthodium oblongatum Clarke, Comp. Ind. (1876), 168. Raised from seed from Nepal, No. 540/1930. August-September. Rock Garden.
- Cremanthodium reniforme Benth. in Hook. Ic. Pl. xii (1876), t. 1141.
  A Composite with nodding heads and yellow florets. Raised from seed from Nepal, No. 542. 1930. August. Rock Garden.
- Cyananthus Delavayi Franch. in Morot, Journ. de Bot. i (1887), 280.
  August. Rock Garden.
- Cyananthus macrocalyx Franch. in Morot, Journ. de Bot. i (1887), 279.
  The form with vellow flowers. July. Rock Garden.
- Cyananthus Wardii Marquand in Journ. Linn. Soc. xlviii (1929), 196.
  A plant from S.E. Tibet, remarkable for its powdery blue flowers and silvery leaves. August. Alpine House.
- Dieranestigma lactucoides Hook f. et Thoms. Fl. Ind. i (1855), 255. Figured in Engler's Pflanzenreich, Papaveraceae (1909), 205. A perennial herb, remarkable for its attractive glaucous-centred foliage and open yellow flowers. Raised from Nepal seed. August, Rock Garden.

- Dimorphotheca Barberiae Harv. in Hook. Bot Mag. lxxxviii (1862), t. 5337. Kilimanjaro. A composite with conspicuous purple rayflorets. February to May. Plant Houses.
- Gentiana cachemirica Decne. in Jacquem. Voy. Bot. (1844), 111, t. 117 (Sect. Isomeria). A prostrate species, native of the Western Himalaya, with clear blue flowers an inch and a quarter in length. June and July. Plant Houses.
- Gentiana Kurroo Royle Illustr. Bot. Himal. (1835), 278, t. 68, f. 2 (Sect. Aptera). The true species with long slender stems, carrying flowers of a deep blue; recently reintroduced from the N.W. Himalaya. August. Rock Garden.
- Gentiana Loderi Hook. f. in Hook. Ic. Pl. xv (1883), t. 1440a; Gard Chron. ser. 3, xcii (1932), 273, fig. 182 (Sect. Isomeria). A tufted species with pale blue flowers an inch in length. July and August. Rock Garden.
- Gentiana Makinoi Kusa. (non Léveillé) in Act. Hort. Petrop. xiii (1893). 60; Miyoshi & Makino Pocket Atlas Alp. Pl. Japan, i (1906), t. 3, fig. 13 (Sect. Pneumonanthe). A tall growing plant about a foot high with a cluster of deep blue, trumpet-shaped, heavily spotted flowers. July. Plant Houses.
- Gentiana saxoas Forst. f. in Act. Holm. (1777), 183, t. 5; Trans. New Zealand Inst., xxvii, 338, Pl. xxviic. A native of New Zealand, this species forms a close tuft of short stems with deep green fleshy leaves. The flowers are white with faint purplish veining. August. Rock Garden.
- Helichrysum Lentii Volk. et O. Hoffm. in Engl. Pflanzenw. Ost.-Afr. C. (1895), 470; Chiovenda & Cortesi, Il. Ruwenzori, Angiosp. (1990), t. 5. A rare "Everlasting" from Mount Kilimaniaro, Central Africa. Presented by the Botanic Garden, Munich. July. Plant Houses.
- Hyacinthus pycnanthus Baker in Journ. Linn. Soc. xi (1871), 430, Armenia. April. Rock Garden.
- Meconopsis superba King ex Prain in Journ. Asiat. Soc. Beng. lxiv, 2 (1895), 377; Ann. R.B.G. Calc. ix (1907), t. 5. A herb 3-5 feet in height with white flowers, raised from Nepal seed. August. Rock Garden.
- Nomocharis Souliei W. W. Smith et W. E. Evans in Notes R.B.G. Edin. xv (1925), 40. Flowers "deep black crimson," fragrant. Raised from Forrest, No. 19632. July. Rock Garden.

- Omphalogramma elegans G. Forrest in Notes R.B.G. Edin. xiv (1923), 55. Raised from Forrest's seed. May. Rose Garden and Rock Garden.
- Onosma Troodi Kotschy in Unger & Kotschy, Cypern (1865), 283; Gard. Chron. ser. 3, xciii (1933), 399, 403. A plant similar to O. tauricum, but smaller. Raised from seed received from Cyprus. May. Rock House.
- Potentilla coriandrifolia D. Don Prod. Fl. Nep. (1825), 232; Gard. Chron. ser. 3, Ixxxix (1931), fig. 250. A unique Potentilla with white flowers, purple blotched at the base of the petals. Raised from Nepal seed. June. Rock Garden.
- Primula angustifolia Torr. in Ann. Lyc. N. York i (1824), 34, t. 3. (Sect. Parryi). A small herb from the temperate zone of the Rocky Mountains. June. Glass Houses.
- Primula blattariformis Franch. in Gard. Chron. ser. 3, i (1887), 575; ibid. lix (1916), 254, fig. 106 (Sect. Malvaceae). A half-hardy species raised from Forrest No. 30665. July. Plant Houses.
- Primula concholoba Stapf & Sealy in Bot. Mag. clv (1932), t. 9289.
  Allied to P. apoclita (Sect. Muscarioides). Raised from Kingdon Ward No. 8406. May. Rock Garden.
- Primula cuneifolia Ledeb. in Mém. Acad. Petersb. v (1814), 522; Notes R.B.G. Edin. viii (1913), t. 22 (Sect. Cuneifolia). Imported from Japan. May. Plant Houses.
- Primula cuneifolia var. hakusanensis Makino in Tokyo Bot. Mag. xvi (1902), 141; Notes R.B.G. Edin. viii, t. 23a. Imported from Japan. May. Plant Houses.
- Primula cuneifolia var. heterodonta Makino in Tokyo Bot. Mag. xvi (1902), 141; Notes R.B.G. Edin. viii, t. 23b. Imported from Japan. May. Plant Houses.
- Primula Edgeworthii Pax in Pflanzenr. Primul. (1905), 41: Gard. Chron. ser. 3, xciii (1933), p. 240 (Sect. Petiolaris). Plants from near Simla sent home by air mail by Captain Lowndes. A notable addition to the three cultivated species of the section Petiolaris. January-February. Rock Garden.
- Primula florida Balf. f. et Forrest in Notes R.B.G. Edin. ix (1915), 16; Gard. Chron. ser. 3, Iviii (1915), 207 (Sect. Souliei). This species, with purple flowers, grows on sandstone rocks in Szechuan. Raised from Forrest No. 30212. July. Plant Houses.

- Primula Jesoana Miq. Prol. Fl. Japon. (1867), p. 283; Notes R.B.G. Edin. viii (1913), t. xv (Sect. Cortusoides). A doubtfully hardy species received from Japan. Flowers rose or magenta. May. Plant Houses.
- Primula macrocarpa Maxim. in Mél. Biol. vi (1867), 269; Notes R.B.G. Edin. viii (1913), t. xx; New Flora and Silva, v, fig. xc (Sect. Farinosae). An interesting dwarf Japanese primrose. June. Plant Houses.
- Primula Normaniana Ward in Ann. Bot. xliv (1930), 123; Gard. Chron. ser. 3, xci (1932), 101, fig. 40 (Sect. Cortusoides). This plant, with dainty, frilled, light magenta flowers, although not very hardy, has survived a winter in the open. April, May. Rock Garden.
- Primula pulchella Franch. in Bull. Soc. Bot. Fr. xxxv (1888), 429; Journ. R.H.S. xxxix (1913), fig. 66 (Sect. Nivales). Flowers clear blue. Forrest No. 28365. July. Plant Houses.
- Primula Rockii W. W. Smith in Notes R.B.G. Edin. xvi (1931), 224 (Sect. Bullatae). A species related to P. Forrestii recently described and introduced, has flowers of the same golden colour but is much smaller. Forrest No. 30280. March. Plant Houses.
- Primula rupicola Balf. f. et Forrest in Notes R.B.G. Edin. ix (1915), 41 (Sect. Souliei). A plant from Yunnan, where it grows on open stony pastures at an altitude of 12,000 ft. Flowers similar in appearance to those of *P. frondosa*. Forrest No. 30252. June. Plant Houses.
- Primula yunnanensis Franch. in Bull. Soc. Bot. Fr. xxxii (1885), 269; Notes R.B.G. Edin. iv (1908), 226 (Sect. Farinosae). A plant with large open flowers, like those of P. Winter, borne singly or in pairs on short, slender stems. Raised from Forrest No. 30314. February. Plant Houses.
- Pteridophyllum racemosum Sieb. & Zucc. in Abh. Akad. Muench. iii, ii (1843), 720; Bot. Mag. t. 8743. A rare Japanese species with a raceme of white flowers. July. Rock Garden.
- Rhododendron auritum Tagg in Rhod. Soc. Notes iii, No. 5 (1032), 278; Notes R.B.G. Edin. xviii (1934), 218. (Boothii Series.) A shrub 10 feet high. Collected in S.E. Tibet. Flowers 4-7 in a truss, creamy-white, tinged pink. Raised from Ward No. 6278. April. Nursery.
- Rhododendron caesium Hutch. in Gard. Chron. ser. 3, xciv (1933), 102. (Triflorum Series.) A shrub of 3-4 feet high. Collected in

W. Yunnan. Flowers greenish-yellow. Forrest No. 26798. June. Nursery.

- Rhododendron deleiense Hutch. et Ward in Notes R.B.G. Edin. xvi (1931), 772. (Boothii Series.) A low shrub from the Delei Valley, Assam, related to Rhododendron tephropeplum. Ward Nos. 8165, 8202. April. Rock Garden.
- Rhododendron mieroleueum Hutch. in Gard. Chron. ser. 3, xciii (1933), 333. (Lapponicum Series.) Flowers pure white. Appeared among plants raised from Forrest's seed. Presented by Mr. Lionel de Rothschild. Nursery.
- Rhododendron micromeres Tagg in Notes R.B.G. Edin. xvi (1931), 211.

  (Glaucum Series.) A straggling epiphytic shrub 3-6 feet high.
  Flowers creamy-yellow. Raised from Forrest's seed. Nursery.
- Rhododendron polyandrum Hutch. in Notes R.B.G. Edin. xii (1919), 25. (Maddenii Series) A bush 3 feet high. Collected by R. E. Cooper in Bhutan. Plant Houses.
- Rhododendron venator Tagg in Notes R.B.G. Edin. xviii (1934), 220. (Irroratum Series.) A shrub 8-10 feet high, flowers deep crimson. Collected in the Tsangpo gorge, S.E. Tibet; Ward No. 6285. May. Wild Garden.
- Stilboearpa polaris A. Gray, Bot. U.S. Expl. Exped. i (1854), 714;
  Kew Bull. (1908), 249. Araliaceae. May. Plant Houses.
